DEATH OF AN OLD COLONIST.

GERALDTON, Wednesday.

An old colonist passed away on Monday night last in the person of Mr. Joseph Watson, of Strawberry. Mr. Watson came into Geraldton seriously ill by train on that day from his son's station at Yoweragabbie, near Mt. Magnet. On the arrival of the train he was conveyed to the Railway Hotel, where he died twenty minutes This morning the remains were taken by train to Dongarra for burial. Mr. Watson leaves a wife and a large family of grownup sons and daughters. In the early days of the colony he was a police constable, and his unique success in capturing aboriginal delinquents in the Victoria district at the time when the place was overran with the dusky savage, made his name a household word throughout Western Australia, and led to the sobriquet of "Immortal Joe" being universally applied to him. He remained in the force about 20 years, attaining the rank of sergeaut before he resigned. For many years past he had been engaged in squatting pursuits in the Irwin district. His age was 75 years. funeral took place at Dongarra to-day, and was largely attended. The pall-bearers were Messrs. S. F. Moore, Delwage, Pell Clarkson and Brand. The interment took place at the Wesleyan Cemetary.
