### "Missing 11:4.17."

If this refers to Cpl. Bradley of C. Coy. I saw and spoke to him on morning of 11th April at the Dressing Station about 2 miles from Bapaume. I think it was the 4th Fld.Amb. Dressing Station. He was whunded but not seriously I think as he was walking. I know of no other Cpl. Bradley in C.Coy.

#### "Missing 11.4.17."

He is a Prisoner of War. Saw him at Marquion about 19Th May. not wounded - but seemed to feel the food shortage more than the others. He was with the working party. I am absolutely sure of his identity. He was a Cpl. with a low number.

> Witness:-L/Cpl. H. Parsons. 5163. 16th Battn. (Escaped Prisoner of War)

Note Witness was clear and quite reliable in all his information. He was twice interviewed, the second time verifying his previous report. In all cases L/Cpl. Parsons was able to supply the rank, number or initial of the missing man. He gave most of the information from memory. He feared to raise suspicion by attempting to compile a complete list from his fellow captives. Naturally he only knew a small percentage of them, but his memory seemed excellent and he was most anxious to supply all possible perticulars. I understand a full teport of heart's and L/Cpl. Parsons experiences has been sent to Australia by Lieut. Col. Murdoch.
