## DEATH OF AN OLD COLONIST.

ONE of the oldest colonists in Western Australia has passed away in the person of Mrs. Hannah Leeder, who died at her residence in Hay steet, west, on Monday afternoon. The deceased lady arrived in this color y in the year 1830, and was the wife of the late Mr. William Leeder, and the mother of a large family, most of whom have married and settled in the colony. Nothwithstanding her years, for at the time of her death she had attained the ripe old age of 91, Mrs. Leeder was, up to a comparatively recent date, a very hale and hearty old lady. During the past eighteen mon'ha the infirmities of age began to press beavily on her, and of late she commenced to fail very rapidly, and on Monday afternoon she quietly breathed her last while she lay sleeping. The funeral took place at five o'clock, on Tuesday afternoon, when the deceased lady was buried in the Church of England cemeters.
