A Sudden Death.

James White, an old age pensioner, was found dead in his but at Trackarings on Friday last. Deceased, who was the father-in-law of Mr. H. F. Hawson, of Hill View, had not been seen about since the 9th instant. On Friday Mr. T. J. Price called at the hut to deliver some goods, and, as on knocking he received no answer, he opened the door and walked in. Deceased was lying fully dressed on the sofs, but life was found to be extinct. The old fellow was known to have been a sufferer from Bright's disease. A magisterial inquiry has since been held by the coroner (Mr. T. Hall), and a finding of death from natural causes was recorded.

The little boy Ernest Fellows, who was injured in a tram acident in Argent-street over two months ago, and has since been admitted to the Hospital suffering from a diseased bone in the leg-a result of the accident—will, it is feared, have to suffer amputation of the limb. This morning, however, the lad was re-ported to be slightly better.

Joseph Brown, employed in Block 13, Proprietary mine, met with a slight accident this morning, shortly after commencing work, which nein Cobalt-street in the ambulance While barring down ground at the 400ft, level, a piece of rock came away, and, striking Brown on the foot, badly bruised it.
